
Vocation Corner - Third Sunday of Easter

Peter . . . said to him, "Lord, you know everything." (John 21:17)

Did you know that stained glass windows get their name from the stains that color them? Artisans add impurities such as metallic salts to the glass, which produce the rich, deep colors. These glass panes lift our hearts whenever

we see them. But when the sunlight illuminates them, their true splendor appears. Peter probably wasn't feeling very "splendid" during his conversation with Jesus in today's Gospel. We can imagine his dismay when Jesus asked, "Do you love me?" not once, but three times. Peter could not have missed the link between Jesus' threefold questioning and Peter's threefold denial. His flaws and failures stood front and center for everyone to see. It was as if a spotlight were shining on Peter and his "impurities."

He could only reply, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you" (John 21:17).

How remarkable that Jesus does not berate or even correct Peter! Quite the opposite, He immediately commands him to feed His sheep. Peter's denials didn't disqualify him from following Jesus or serving him.

Rather, they served as lessons in humility and prepared him for his mission.

We all fall short from time to time as we try to follow the Lord. Our weaknesses and sins hinder us from loving and obeying Jesus as we should. But like Peter, we can learn from our failures and humbly return to the Lord for the grace to begin again. Nothing disqualifies us from our call to be Jesus' disciples and feed his sheep.

Just as impurities in stained glass bring forth beauty when the sun shines upon it,

our weaknesses can show the Lord's grace when we come into His light.

So let's not stay in the darkness counting our stains. Let's come into the light and let it shine through us.

"Lord, you know everything; shine through me today."

Our Lady of the Cape – Pilgrim Statue Tour

Canada was Consecrated to the Immaculate Heart of Mary in Ottawa in 1947. This year, we celebrate the 75th Anniversary of this event. The Marian Statue that was used at the time was from Canada's National Marian Shrine located at Cap de la Madeleine near Trois Rivières, Quebec. The original statue is known as Our Lady of the Cape. As a result, the Marian Devotional Movement is visiting various dioceses in Canada in 2022 as it spearheads pilgrim statue tours of Our Lady of the Cape to provide opportunities for Canadians to venerate Canada's National Madonna, to promote consecration to the Immaculate Heart of Mary and to promote enrollment in the Confraternity of the Most Holy Rosary.

A replica statue of Our Lady of the Cape will be touring our diocese Exact dates, times and locations are as follows :

May 18 – Sacred Heart Cathedral - Prince Albert – Time: Noon Mass, Quiet prayer/devotion for the afternoon, 7-8pm Marian Hour

Thursday May 19 – Our Lady of Peace – Meadow Lake – Time: 7-8pm Marian Hour May 20 – Notre Dame de Lourdes – North Battleford – Time: 1:30 – 3 (Introduction / Rosary & Prayer), 4-7pm Quiet prayer/devotion, 7-8pm Marian Hour
