Feast of St. Joseph—March 19th



5th Sunday of Lent

"He was chosen by the eternal Father as the trustworthy guardian and protector of His greatest treasures, namely, His Divine Son and Mary, Joseph's wife," says St. Bernardine of Siena. "He carried out this vocation with complete fidelity until at last God called him, saying 'Good and faithful servant, enter into the joy of your Lord.'" The Church traditionally dedicates the month of March to the special veneration of St. Joseph.

Symbols associated with St. Joseph include the carpenter's square and lily, symbolizing his trade but also the concept of truth. The lily represents purity and his celibate marriage to the Virgin Mary. St. Joseph is the patron saint of the Universal Church, and workers.

Prayer to St. Joseph, Protector of the Church- Caring Joseph, collaborator in God's project for humanity, your tenderness enfolds the newborn Church as you enfolded your newborn son. Just as Mary and Jesus recognize in you the protection of the Father, so too does the community of faith place itself under your protection. Strengthen us with the spirit that imbued the Nazarene home. Guide our progress on the passage toward the kingdom.

Accompany us in carrying out our mission. Help us to be lights in the world so that the family of God may spring forth from humanity transfigured in Christ. Grant us the patience to imitate God's preference for the poor and weak. Guide us in our pastoral activities that our actions may be modeled on the Good News. Amen

Fifth Sunday of Lent – A Vocation View: Unless a seed first dries out and dies, it cannot be planted in the earth to grow. Unless we first dry out and die to our selfish ways, we can never expect to be people who will 'lay down their lives for their friends.'

Prayer: That God's name will be glorified, by the faithful love of those men and women being called by Christ to serve and follow Him as priests, deacons and in the consecrated life, we pray to the Lord.

Action: The consecrated life inspires and accompanies the spread of evangelization in the different parts of the world, where Institutes from abroad are gratefully welcomed and new ones are being founded, in a great variety of forms and expressions. Consequently, although in some parts of the world Institutes of Consecrated Life seem to be experiencing a period of difficulty, in other places they are prospering with remarkable vitality. This shows that the choice of total self-giving to God in Christ is in no way incompatible with any human culture or historical situation. *Pope John Paul II, Apostolic Exhortation Vita Consecrata, no. 2*



When I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw everyone to myself. (John 12:32)

This is not the first time in John's Gospel that Jesus uses the image of being "lifted up" to describe His crucifixion



(John 12:32). Earlier, Jesus compared Moses' lifting of the serpent in the desert to Himself being "lifted up" (3:14). Then, speaking to the religious leaders, He said, "When you lift up the Son of Man, then you will realize that I AM" (8:28).
Of course, after Jesus was nailed to a cross, He was physically lifted up. But John's repeated use of the phrase goes beyond that. Jesus' crucifixion, as horrible and painful as it was, was also an exaltation. That's because through His cross and resurrection,

Jesus saved the world. It was a victory over sin, Satan, and death.

This is the paradox of the cross. It was through Jesus' suffering and death that He was glorified—and brought glory to His Father's name (John 12:28). It was by becoming that grain of wheat that falls to the ground and dies that Jesus was able to produce "much fruit" (12:24). That "fruit"—our salvation—is why we reverence the cross. It is also why Jesus could talk of His impending death as a lifting up. It was truly a triumph of love over death.

Jesus also promised to "draw everyone" to Himself (John 12:32). This, too, was the fruit of His sacrifice. The cross removed the barrier of sin that blocked our relationship with the Father. Now, forgiven and made blameless through Jesus' blood, we have become sons and daughters of God. Drawn into the heart of the Trinity,

we can enjoy eternal life with God, both now and forever.

Today at Mass, gaze at the crucifix above the altar and let it speak to you of God's infinite love for you. Then praise and thank Jesus for His willingness to suffer and die so that you might live.

"Jesus, I exalt your name over all the earth!"

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
